**DRAFT REPORT OF THE FOURTH MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE
BOARD OF THE GLOBAL FRAMEWORK ON CHEMICALS¹ FUND**

1. Opening and welcome

1. The co-chairs of the Executive Board of the Global Framework on Chemicals Fund, Ivo de Zwaan (the Netherlands) and Santos Virgilio (Angola) welcomed the Board members and registered observers to the fourth meeting of the Executive Board. The presence of online Board members and registered observers was confirmed. New Board members and all other participants were invited to introduce themselves.
2. The co-chairs invited the Global Framework on Chemicals Secretariat to introduce new personnel and provide a short update on staffing.

2. Organizational matters

3. The co-chairs presented the provisional agenda (GFC/EB.4.1/1/Rev.1) and annotated provisional agenda (GFC/EB.4.1/1/Add.1/Rev.1) that were circulated on 10 February 2026. No additional points were raised under any other business, and the agenda was adopted.
4. The co-chairs explained that the primary objective of the meeting was to consider concept notes received under the second round of applications with the aim of selecting promising applications. These applicants would be asked to develop a full application package for consideration by the Executive Board. The second objective was to agree on a proposal for the future terms of reference” (TOR) of the Fund, to be forwarded to the International Conference for consideration and adoption at that meeting, following the decision to review the provisionally adopted TOR as stated in ICCM5 resolution V/3.
5. The Board members agreed to the proposal for the organization of work of the meeting presented by the co-chairs and as set out in annex I of the annotated agenda. The co-chairs outlined the meeting and hybrid arrangements and reminded members of the rules of conduct, including recusals for conflicts of interest during the appraisal of concept notes (agenda item 5.2).

3. Adoption of the report of the third meeting of the Executive Board

6. The co-chairs invited comments on the draft report of the third meeting of the Executive Board (GFCF/EB.3/5) held in Geneva from 19 to 21 March 2025 and online from 26 to 28 May 2025, which was circulated to the Board members on 12 June 2025 and uploaded to the website after incorporation of the comments. With no further comments, the Executive Board adopted the report of the third meeting.²

4. Update on operations of the GFC Fund

7. The Secretariat presented the report on operations of the Global Framework on Chemicals Fund (GFC/EB.4.1/2/Rev.2) which included an update on the activities undertaken since the last meeting of

the Executive Board, in particular on the status of the four projects approved under the first round, the current financial situation of the Fund, an outlook on the expected future project pipeline and workload and a proposal for staffing and budget from the second quarter of 2026 to the first quarter of 2027. The co-chairs invited the Board to make comments, raise questions, and take decisions on matters related to financial planning, Secretariat capacity, and future programming, as appropriate and subject to decisions at the International Conference regarding the extension of the time limit of the Fund.

8. The Secretariat presented a budget and staffing proposal, including a proposal for one additional P-3 Programme Management Officer and one additional P-2 Associate Programme Management Officer. Board members requested clarification on the number of projects that can be effectively managed by the Fund Secretariat and asked for references based on the experience of the Special Programme. The Secretariat noted that while the two funding mechanisms have common features to a certain extent, the Fund primarily works with more complex, regional projects which have larger financial volumes. Additionally, the Secretariat highlighted the high workload resulting from the high number of applications received in both funding rounds to date. Some members expressed reservations regarding the creation of additional staff positions at this stage until a decision is made by the International Conference.
9. Subsequently, the Secretariat presented an updated proposal, noting that staff positions that remained vacant to date had resulted in lower actual expenditures than those approved in the budget at the Board's second meeting (June 2024). The Secretariat further explained that these savings have been used to address operational needs through temporary and targeted consultancy support during the start-up and appraisal phases, while remaining within the limits of the approved budget and only using financial resources from the Global Framework on Chemicals Trust Fund.
10. The Board members expressed support for this flexible approach as an interim measure until the first International Conference. At the same time, several members emphasized the importance of maintaining a well-staffed Secretariat with permanent capacity to ensure continuity and effective project implementation. The updated budget and staffing proposal for the Fund are attached to this report (Annex 3).

5. Consideration of eligible and complete concept notes

5.1. Overview of the concept notes and reflections on the funding envelope for the second round

11. The Secretariat introduced the document entitled *Overview of phase 1 of the second round of applications* (GFC/EB.4.1/3/Rev.1) and provided an overview of the second round of applications, including information on the approach taken and relevant statistics. The call for applications resulted in a total of 138 eligible concept notes which were reviewed by the Secretariat and appraised by the Executive Board members in February and March 2026 in five appraisal groups organized to avoid conflicts of interest. The full list of eligible applications considered by the Executive Board is available in Annex 2 to this report.
12. Given the high number of eligible submissions, each appraisal group prioritized a subset of proposals for full Board consideration, while all members had access to all concept notes and could flag any proposal for additional discussion. This approach ensured that all eligible concept notes were reviewed while facilitating focused and structured deliberations within the time available at the fourth Board meeting. Through this process, the Board prioritized 29 eligible concept notes for further discussion at the meeting. While the Board did not agree on a funding envelope, there was broad agreement of selecting between 15 and 20 concept notes for the next stage, taking into account that the Secretariat will only be able to effectively administer and support a smaller number of projects.
13. In this context, the Secretariat highlighted the significant gap between the total funding requested under the second round and the resources currently available in the Fund. This shows the importance of prioritization and strategic selection of concept notes and may warrant further consideration by the Executive Board in future rounds regarding funding priorities.

5.2. Presentations and final appraisals of concept notes

14. For the selection of concept notes for the next stage of the application process, the Executive Board agreed on adopting an approach similar to that of the first application round: the 29 prioritized concept notes were split into batches organized by commonalities such as region and economic status. At the outset of each batch, the Secretariat briefly introduced the applications in the batch. Board members then took the floor to discuss each concept note, providing their recommendation to select or not select based on key impact factors, including the alignment with the Fund's priorities and criteria, the project's expected result, sustainability of outcomes, structure, clarity, multi-stakeholder and cross-sectoral aspects, overlap with or duplication of previous projects and of tools already available, and budget.

15. In this process, the Executive Board considered each concept note on its merits with a view to shortlisting those concept notes that will be invited to develop a full application. In making its decision, the Board considered that shortlisting concept notes at this meeting will lead to the development of full application packages, which entails additional efforts by both applicants and the Secretariat and may create expectations regarding future funding.
16. In this regard, the Board agreed on the importance of maintaining a manageable number of shortlisted concept notes to ensure meaningful technical support by the Secretariat during the development phase and to avoid creating unrealistic expectations among applicants.
17. The Board selected a total of 16 concept notes for the next stage as outlined in the table below. This listing is not to be read as constituting any kind of ranking:

18. The Secretariat informed the Board that all applicants will be notified about the outcome of the meeting. The non-selected proposals will receive a generic notification unless otherwise advised by the Board while the selected applicants will receive individual comments for necessary clarifications and improvements of applications, based on the Board's appraisal and discussion at the meeting.
19. Furthermore, the Secretariat outlined the next steps of the application process: the Secretariat will provide additional support to selected applicants, including a webinar to introduce the next steps of the process as well as a helpdesk and one-hour individual support sessions. Following the deadline for submissions of the full application package (15 June 2026), the Secretariat will review the applications. In July and August, the Executive Board, with support from the Secretariat, will appraise the applications. At its next meeting in September, the Board will then make the final decision on the projects.

6. "Future Terms of Reference" of the Fund for consideration at the International Conference

20. The Secretariat introduced the document entitled *Draft "Future terms of reference of the Global Framework on Chemicals Fund"* (GFC/EB.4.1/4) and provided an overview of the Fund's Terms of Reference (TOR), which were provisionally adopted at the fifth session of the International Conference on Chemicals Management (ICCM5) in September 2023 and are scheduled for review at the first session of the International Conference of the Global Framework on Chemicals. In preparation for this review, consultations were held with stakeholders during the first meeting of the Open-Ended Working Group in Punta del Este in June 2025, followed by a written call for input. Additional consultations among Executive Board members took place in January and February 2026. Based on these consultations, the Secretariat prepared a revised draft TOR document to support further discussions by the Executive Board, with a view to finalizing its consultations and adopting a document for submission to the International Conference.
21. The Board reviewed the document section by section, highlighting proposed changes with the aim of reaching agreement on outstanding issues. It agreed to place brackets around elements and paragraphs where consensus could not be reached and noted that the entire document remains open for discussion at the Conference, while non-bracketed text reflects areas of agreement among Board members.
22. Subsequently, the Board discussed forward-looking considerations that could strengthen the catalytic role of the Fund and support broader resource mobilization for the implementation of the Global Framework on Chemicals, presented in document GFC/EB.4.1/4. While expressing general support for exploring innovative approaches to leverage funding, including engagement with the private sector and blended finance, several members noted that such approaches would require additional expertise and should be approached cautiously given the current scale of the Fund. The Board agreed that these elements should be further developed in an information document for consideration by the International Conference, rather than incorporated at this stage into the Terms of Reference. Several members also suggested that, where appropriate, such elements of innovative financing could be progressively reflected in project design.

7. Consideration of matters arising from joint meeting with Executive Board of the Special Programme

23. A joint informal meeting between the Boards of the Special Programme and the Global Framework on Chemicals Fund took place on Tuesday afternoon. Ahead of this meeting, the Secretariat provided an information document (GFC/EB.4/INF/1) to inform the Executive Board about the strengthened cooperation between the Special Programme and Global Framework on Chemicals Secretariats. This document was also circulated to the GFC Bureau and the Executive Board of the Special Programme for information purposes.
24. Following the joint meeting, Board members commended the document and the efficient use of the available resources as well as knowledge-sharing across the funding mechanisms. Overall, the joint meeting served to take note of UNEP's approach to putting more coordination among the Secretariats into practice.
25. Furthermore, the Board reflected on the options for the launch of a third round of the Fund and the possibility of a joint launch with the Special Programme's ninth round. Given the ongoing second round and the pending decision on the Fund's extension (subject to the International Conference), the Executive Board decided not to launch a third round at this time. Instead, the Board asked the Secretariat to start preparations for a third round to possibly be launched in December 2026 or early 2027, contingent on decisions by the International Conference regarding the timeline of the Fund.

8. Next meeting of the Executive Board

26. The co-chairs informed the Board that, ahead of this Executive Board meeting, the Secretariat had circulated a workplan indicating a second session to take place in September 2026. The meeting is expected to focus on the consideration and final approval of full project proposals shortlisted under the second round of applications, as well as on preparations for a potential third round of applications, subject to decisions on the Fund's timeframe extension.
27. The proposed meeting will take place as an online meeting in the afternoons (13:00-17:00, Geneva time) of Monday, 14 September to Wednesday, 16 September 2026.

9. Any other business

28. The co-chairs invited Board members and observers to raise any matters for consideration under any other business.

29. The Secretariat invited the Board to provide feedback on the first phase of the second round of applications. Board members expressed strong appreciation for the Secretariat's organization of the second round, noting that the process was smoother, more structured, and significantly improved compared to the first round, particularly due to the clear and pre-filled appraisal forms. Several members highlighted that reviewing concept notes was more manageable than assessing the full applications in the first round. At the same time, some members noted challenges due to missing information, truncated text in scanned documents, and the need for clearer guidance on evaluation criteria, co-financing calculations, and links to previous or ongoing projects.
30. Some Board members raised concerns about budget allocations, including a number of overbudgeted as well as potentially underbudgeted activities, and the difficulty of assessing overlaps with previous or ongoing initiatives. A few Board members suggested creating a short introductory document or scheduling a call with new Board members to familiarize them with the appraisal process. Others requested more information on other initiatives in applicant countries, and greater consideration of regional diversity in future rounds. Overall, the Board valued the Secretariat's support and encouraged continued refinement of the two-phase approach.
31. No other business was raised.

10. Closure of the meeting

32. Following the customary exchange of courtesies, the first session of the fourth meeting was closed on Wednesday 25 March 2026, at 12:58 CET.
