Ministerial Declaration of the United Nations Environment Assembly at its seventh session

Advancing sustainable solutions for a resilient planet

[29 May 2025]

1. We, the world's ministers for the environment, have gathered in Nairobi, Kenya, together with representatives of international organizations, major groups and other stakeholders, at the seventh session of the United Nations Environment Assembly, with the urgent aim of advancing sustainable solutions for a resilient planet.
2. We reaffirm all the principles of the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development, as well as the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals.

6. We recognize that the interconnected nature of the global environmental challenges and crises, including climate change, biodiversity loss, desertification, drought and land degradation, pollution, sand and dust storms among others, [as well as the related constraints, especially those faced by developing countries](#), requires urgent and collective responses from the international community, and therefore **decide to take the following actions:**

Action 1: We will take ~~bold~~ actions that drive sustainable solutions to address the global environmental challenges and crises of our time.

- A. We, recognizing the importance of sustainable development as a priority, call on Member States to advance sustainable and integrated solutions and promote cooperation and exchange among governments, international organizations, the scientific community and civil society.
- B. Strengthen international and regional cooperation to prevent and reduce [all forms of transboundary pollution and the related issues](#) and ~~prioritize~~ [promote](#) the development of advanced monitoring systems, [which requires financial, and technical support, as well as,](#)

Commented [KL1]: The development of ADVANCED monitoring systems needs capacity building, financial and technology transfer for developing countries that lack capacities to develop such systems. It can not be prioritized without adequate support. For that it is more relevant to promote the development of this systems. Otherwise keeping prioritize should be followed by adequate language on adequate support.

capacity building support for developing countries to effectively track and manage these issues across borders, ensuring including through utilizing evidence-based and science-driven approach to pollution control and environmental resilience.

- C. Encourage Member States to advance circular economy approaches and policy responses towards sustainable consumption and production patterns that promote resource efficiency, waste minimization and the rethinking of product design and life cycles, advance incentives and innovation and drive a systemic-shifts towards sustainability, whilst reducing environmental impact for a resilient planet.
- D. Champion-Prioritize a just transition towards a clean, healthy and sustainable environment by advocating for The Rio Declaration on Environment and Development principles, mainly, Common but Differentiated Responsibilities, the widespread accessibility and adoption of renewable energy and-energy efficient technologies, including through the provision of adequate support and means of implementation to developing countries, -and reduced resource intensity, in an effort to create just and equitable societies, leaving no one behind.
- E. Recognizing that increasing water scarcity poses a significant challenge to the achievement of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and affects the resilience of ecosystems, communities, and economies, we reaffirm our commitment to enhancing sustainable water management, strengthening cooperation at all levels, and supporting innovative solutions, including and nature-based solutions-ones, in a manner that promote water efficiency and equitable access to safe and clean water. We encourage Member States and relevant stakeholders to share knowledge, build capacity, and mobilize resources to address water-related challenges in a holistic and integrated manner.
- F. Advance the implementation of the One Health approach at all levels, whilst enhancing the science, knowledge and evidence amongst countries and stakeholders, for a coordinated and cross-sectoral response, and promoting the Quadripartite One Health Alliance to enhance its policy impact, in line with national circumstances and priorities.
- G. Encourage all Member States to pursue ambitious Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and to implement concretely National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) to advance resilient solutions, including Nature-based solutions, whilst ensuring sustainable resource management, the swift implementation of the New Collective Quantified Goal on Climate Finance, and the inclusive engagement of all-relevant stakeholders and sectors within each country-

G alt. Encourage all Member States to take steps to pursue ambition NDCs, in a manner that accelerates the achievement of the objectives of the Paris Agreement.

Commented [KL2]: The NDCs are not a channel to implement NAPs, this insertion is incoherent for the reasons that :

- 1) The NDCs are part of the Paris Agreement framework, while the NAPs come from the system established by the Convention;
- 2) Everything related to the NDCs is legally binding. This is not the case for the NAPs, which are voluntary;
- 3) There is no mechanism in the PA or in the implementation decisions that allows NAPs to be implemented through NDCs;
- 4) The PA recognizes NDCs as a 'channel' for communication on adaptation, not for the implementation of policies in this area.

For this, it is important to separate between the two reporting channels.
Below, alternative proposals to separate this paragraph and make it more coherent.

G. alt. Bis. Invite all Member States to adopt concrete policies, measures and programmes that facilitate the implementation of NAPs, by advancing practical solutions, including nature-based ones.

G alt. Ter. Act for the swift implementation of the NCOG on climate finance, as well as the commitment of relevant stakeholders.

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- H. Stress the need to enhance coordination, coherence and integration between early warning systems and disaster risk management systems to advance climate-resilient development and strengthen preparedness, response and recovery capacities in the face of anthropogenic or climate-induced disasters, including droughts, heavy rains, wildfires, heat waves, famines floods, sand and dust storms among others, leaving no one behind, and call for the strengthening of disaster risk governance by integrating of disaster risk reduction into policies, programmes, and investments at all levels, and enhanced support for developing countries, including Least Developed Countries (LDCs), Landlocked Developing Countries (LLDCs), Small Islands Developing States (SIDS), and countries facing specific challenges, recognizing that these challenges are often exacerbated by climate fragility, armed conflicts, migration and displacement issues, among other factors.
- I. Encourage Member States to incorporate, where relevant, sustainable digital solutions and Artificial Intelligence (AI) in national development plans as innovative solutions that contribute to accelerating the achievement of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and cooperate to deepen knowledge and the scientific assessment of the environmental impacts of AI, exchange best practices for responsible deployment, while ensuring the encouraging accessibility and affordability of data and AI tools as appropriate, leaving no one behind.

Action 2: We will implement multilateral environmental agreements and other internationally agreed environmental frameworks with collective resolve and commitment.

- J. Advance the swift implementation of the Global Framework on Chemicals to protect human health and the environment from harmful effects of chemicals and waste, by promoting the sound management of chemicals and waste across all sectors, which contributes directly to the Sustainable Development Goals.
- K. {Placeholder} on the outcome of the resumed third session of the ad hoc open-ended working group on a science-policy panel to contribute further to the sound management of chemicals and waste and to prevent pollution.
- L. {Placeholder} on the outcome of the fifth session of the Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee to develop an international legally binding instrument on plastic pollution, including in the marine environment taking into consideration national circumstances and capabilities for developing countries.

- M. Call upon all States and regional economic integration organizations that have not done so to consider signing and ratifying, approving or accepting the Agreement under the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea on the Conservation and Sustainable Use of Marine Biological Diversity of Areas Beyond National Jurisdiction (BBNJ Agreement), towards its effective implementation. This milestone reflects our shared commitment to strengthening ocean governance, advancing equity, and safeguarding marine biodiversity for current and future generations.
- N. Advance the swift implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework and strive for the achievement of the Land Degradation Neutrality targets [among other targets](#) of the UNCCD through effective policy responses and [the provision of adequate and predictable](#) financial resources to halt and reverse biodiversity loss; address ecosystem [challenges, desertification](#), land degradation and drought, [-including](#) through land restoration, land protection and conservation; maintain ecosystem services and develop sustainable food and agricultural production systems that can enhance food security.

Action 3: We will advance equity, inclusive societal participation and accessible means of implementation in our actions for the benefit of present and future generations.

- O. Ensure adequate and predictable means of implementation for developing countries to enable them to ~~advance sustainable solutions~~ [achieve Sustainable Development](#) to tackle the global interconnected environmental challenges and crises through adequate financing, capacity-building, and technology transfer.
- P. Welcome efforts to reform the international financial architecture and the financing for development system, inviting cooperation and policy responses from all Member States and Observer States of the United Nations, relevant stakeholders, international financial institutions, global funds and financial mechanisms, multilateral development banks and private foundations.
- Q. Invite Member States to promote gender equality and enhance the engagement of women, girls, youth, civil society, Indigenous Peoples, local communities in the conservation and protection of the environment and ensuring their inclusive and meaningful participation in decision-making processes to advance sustainable solutions for a resilient planet, whilst protecting and promoting the human right to a clean, healthy and sustainable environment.

- R. ~~Call-on-Invite~~ Member States to deepen cooperation and collaboration with Indigenous Peoples to incorporate indigenous and local knowledge and practices in environmental decision-making, while further emphasizing the importance of localized and culturally sensitive approaches that empower all segments of society and contribute to inclusive and sustainable development, leaving no one is left behind.

Action 4: We will promote effective and coherent global environmental governance that adheres to the rules of international law.

- S. In light of the accelerating and multifaceted environmental and climate challenges that pose significant risks to the planet, it is imperative to build ~~decisively~~ upon existing UNEA resolution 6/4 on promoting synergies, cooperation or collaboration for national implementation of multilateral environmental agreements and other relevant environmental instruments with clearly articulated roles and responsibilities in line with RIO principles. Such a coordinated and integrated approach will unify global efforts, optimize synergies, and ensure the delivery of efficient, effective, and coherent environmental outcomes aligned with our shared international commitments and the urgent demands of our time.
- T. Collaborate towards the full implementation of the UNEA resolution 6/12 to increase the effectiveness of environmental assistance and recovery in areas affected by armed conflict, while urging all Member States to adhere to the rules of international law, including the Charter of the United Nations, human rights law and international humanitarian law, as applicable, in relation to the protection of the environment in areas affected by armed conflict.
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
