Agenda Item 5: Recent Developments in Pollution Prevention and Control of the Marine and Coastal Environment, including emerging issues

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Note by the Secretariat

In line with the “Programme of Work and Budget for 2024-2025,” adopted by COP 23 (Portoroz, Slovenia, 5-8 December 2023), MED POL was mandated to take national and regional actions, including enabling investments, to implement the adopted Regional Plans (Activity 1.2.2). Additionally, under the EU-funded Marine Litter MED PLUS Project (2024-2027) aiming to further support and expand the implementation of the updated Regional Plan on Marine Litter Management in the Mediterranean, MED POL has analysed global and regional policies, as well as legally binding measures relevant to LBS Protocol, to develop a region-wide, agreed-upon short list of key prevention and reduction measures for inclusion in the updated NAPs (2025-2035), including those addressing marine litter.

This report focuses on pollution prevention and reduction measures related to land-based sources, with particular attention to marine litter, plastic pollution, nature-based solutions (NbS), eutrophication, nutrient management, as well as sustainable consumption and production.

The meeting is expected to review and approve this report during “The Third Regional Meeting for the Development/Update of NAPs (2025-2035) and Finalization of the 5th Cycle of NBB Reports”. Upon approval, it will be submitted to the MED POL FPs Meeting, scheduled to for 17-19 June 2025, for further elaboration.

1. Introduction

1. The Mediterranean region continues to face significant environmental challenges due to land-based pollution, marine litter, plastic pollution, and eutrophication, among others. The Barcelona Convention and its Protocols, particularly the Land-Based Sources (LBS) Protocol and its Regional Plans, provide the regional legal framework for addressing pollution affecting marine and coastal environments stemming from land-based sources. Developed under Article 5 of LBS Protocol, The National Action Plans (NAPs) serve as a key implementation tool for Contracting Parties to meet their obligations under the Convention and Protocols and achieve Good Environmental Status (GES) concerning pollution related ecological objectives under the ecosystem approach (EcAP).

2. The MED POL Programme of the UNEP Mediterranean Action Plan (UNEP/MAP) is responsible for coordinating regional efforts to prevent and reduce pollution from land-based sources. The Programme of Work (PoW) for 2024-2025, adopted by COP 23 (Portorož, Slovenia, December 2023), mandates MED POL to take action to implement the adopted Regional Plans (act 1.2.2). In this context, MEDPOL is supporting contracting parties in reviewing and updating their NAPs to integrate both new regional commitment and emerging global policies. The EU-funded Marine Litter MED PLUS Project (2024-2027) further supports these efforts, particularly by enhancing the integration of measures addressing marine litter and plastic pollution into the NAPs.

3. The recent developments at the global level, in particular UNEA Resolutions and current negotiations on the Global Treaty on Plastic Pollution, necessitates to revise alignment between global commitments and regional frameworks and to ensure coherence in implementation at national level.

4. This Policy Analysis Report aims to support the development and update of NAPs by analysing global and regional policy developments since 2015, i.e. when the current NAPs were endorsed. The report will assess alignment between UNEA Resolutions and COP Decisions (Barcelona Convention) and thus identify any gaps in policy implementation, and the emerging issues that needs to be tackled at regional or national level.

5. The focus of this report is on land-based sources pollution prevention and reduction measures, including nature-based solutions (NbS), with particular attention to marine litter, plastic pollution, eutrophication and nutrient management, as well as sustainable consumption and production.

6. The objectives of the report are to:

- **Identify and assess key global resolutions and regional decisions:** Examine relevant UNEA resolutions and COP decisions (Barcelona Convention) adopted since 2015, with a focus on pollution prevention, eutrophication, marine litter, and plastic pollution, and select those most pertinent to the Mediterranean context, particularly those contributing to IMAP Ecological Objectives 5, 9, and 10.
- **Compare governance provisions and highlight policy gaps:** Analyse provisions on measures across global and regional levels, identifying correspondences, and policy gaps, and provide a brief analysis of the latest European policy developments on marine litter, eutrophication, and plastic pollution that could inform future NAP measures.
- **Propose measures for NAPs and MTS:** Suggest key pollution prevention and reduction measures to address the identified gaps for the formulation of updated NAPs for the 2025-2035 period, along with regional measures to inform the next

UNEP/MAP Medium-term Strategy (MTS).

7. This report was prepared with the support of the EU-funded Marine Litter MED PLUS Project (2024-2027).

2. Methodology

1.1 The Rational of the approach

8. A methodological approach has been applied aiming to analyse at global, regional, and EU level the policies (Resolutions, COP decisions, Framework Directives etc.,) aiming to identify, review and compare policies across governance levels, map commonalities and gaps between global and regional frameworks and propose key measures for NAPs development/ update (National level) and next MTS (Regional level), based on the findings. A detailed illustration of the decision trees for the policy assessment is provided in Annexes II and Annex III for UNEA Resolutions and Barcelona Convention Decisions respectively of this report.

9. The timeline of the screening of relevant policies starts from 2015, as it is the time when NAPs were approved, and their implementation has commenced. Using the methodology, at global level, (i) UNEA Resolutions adopted between 2015 and 2024 i.e. UNEA3, UNEA4, UNEA5.1, UNEA5.2 and UNEA6; (ii) Working documents of the Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee on plastic pollution (INC) in charge of developing an international legally binding instrument on plastic pollution, including in the marine environment were analysed. At regional level, all decisions of Barcelona Convention between 2015 and 2023, in focusing on not only the decisions related to the “new” Regional Plans, but also former Regional Plans adopted before 2015.

10. On the other hand, at European Union level, the policy analysis focused on regulations and other policies addressing marine litter, plastic pollution, and eutrophication published between 2020 and 2025.

11. The analytical approach varied slightly depending on the governance level and consisted of number of steps accordance with Annex II and III.

12. For regional-level decisions (UNEP/MAP) there were two steps as follows:

- **Step 1: Selection by theme** – COP Decisions were screened for relevance to key environmental themes (namely land-based pollution, plastic pollution/marine litter, sustainable consumption and production (SCP), nutrient management, and nature-based solutions).
- **Step 2: Policy review and classification** – Relevant COP decisions were mapped for alignment with IMAP Ecological Objectives (EO5: Eutrophication, EO9: Pollution, EO10: Marine Litter) and decisions only containing provisions requiring national implementation were retained for further comparison.

13. For global-level resolutions (UNEA) there were five steps and one additional step applied as follows:

- **Step 1: Selection by theme** – Resolutions were screened for relevance to key environment themes.
- **Step 2: Policy review and classification** – Resolutions were mapped in alignment with IMAP Ecological Objectives and implementation requirements for UNEA Member States.
- **Step 3: Relevance evaluation** – Resolutions were prioritized for in the Mediterranean context, and classified as high, medium, or low priority.

- **Step 4: Alignment check** – The correspondence between UNEA resolutions and Barcelona Convention decisions was examined. Fully covered resolutions by COP decisions were documented and eliminated, while partially or poorly addressed resolutions were analysed to identify further gaps.
- **Step 5: Measure formulation** – Identified gaps were translated into proposed NAP measures, with additional regional recommendations where applicable. Also, NAP Measures were classified into five categories: policy, legal, institutional, economic/financial, and technological/technical.
- **Additional Step: EU regulatory framework** - For key themes of plastic pollution/marine litter, to **support** further alignment of proposed NAP measures stemming from the regulatory framework; policy documents published since 2020 up until 2025 have been catalogued, and for the proposed NAP measures related to plastic pollution/marine litter and eutrophication, a review of their alignment with the EU level was performed.

1.2 Limitations and challenges faced while performing the analysis

14. The analysis faced challenges due to differences in policy formulation and legal frameworks across global (UNEA), regional (Barcelona Convention), and European (EU) levels, making direct comparisons difficult. UNEA resolutions are primarily high-level political commitments that offer general recommendations or calls to action on specific issues, but they are non-binding and do not impose legal obligations on UNEA member states. In contrast, decisions under the Barcelona Convention, especially those related to the LBS Protocol, create a legally binding framework for Contracting Parties, with specific obligations that are often directly translated into concrete measures. At the EU level, policy documents vary widely such as Action Plans, Strategies, Regulations and Directives. Measures arising from EU Directives or Regulations are typically more detailed than those found in NAPs, which adds to the complexity of the comparison.

15. In particular, formulating NAP measures from UNEA Resolutions is challenging, as a single provision in a resolution provides general **policy guidance that could translate into multiple potential national measures**, making prioritization and alignment across frameworks complex. Since the prioritization and alignment are left to discretions Member States, the NAP measures proposed in this report would need to be adapted to fit each national context where appropriate.

16. **The delay and uncertainty surrounding negotiations for the Global Treaty on Plastic Pollution** created challenges in ensuring a comprehensive analysis on the theme “marine litter and plastic pollution”. The **current** draft text remains highly fragmented, with numerous brackets indicating unresolved significant disagreements among member states, while an additional Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee (INC) meeting is in the pipeline.

17. Finally, the **cross-cutting nature of environmental challenges and the interconnections among policy areas** meant that many decisions were not straightforward and, very often, required balancing **multiple** factors before reaching a final conclusion. This was particularly the case during the screening of UNEA Resolutions and their categorization under a single theme. For instance, several water management resolutions were classified under land-based pollution but are also relevant to nutrient management. Similarly, Sustainable Consumption and Production (SCP) resolutions contribute to reducing land-based and plastic pollution, highlighting the interconnections between policy areas.

3. Developments on global and regional framework between 2015-2025

18. Over the past decade, significant policy developments have taken place at the global, regional, and European levels to address land-based pollution, marine litter, plastic pollution, sustainable consumption and production (SCP), nutrient management, and nature-based solutions (NbS). This section provides an overview of selected global policies adopted, between 2015 and 2024, under the United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA) and decisions adopted within the framework of the Barcelona Convention. Additionally, relevant European Union (EU) legislation between 2020 and 2025 (February) addressing marine litter, plastic pollution, and eutrophication has also been included.

19. At each chapter, a summary of key policy advancements is provided, followed by a list of selected resolutions in accordance with the methodology selected for analysis. These decisions (including resolutions and policies) are structured around the predefined themes (land-based pollution, marine litter, plastic pollution, SCP, nutrient management, and NbS).

3.1. Review of UNEA Resolutions (2015-2025)

20. Between 2015 and 2025, the UNEA has progressively advanced global environmental governance through a series of resolutions aimed at addressing critical environmental issues clustered by (i) land-based pollution; (ii) marine litter plastic pollution; (iii) nutrient management and (iv) sustainable consumption and production; and (v) Nature Based Solutions. At UNEA-3 (2017), the focus was placed on tackling pollution in all its forms, leading to key resolutions on marine litter, soil pollution, water quality, and hazardous chemicals. Building on this, UNEA-4 (2019) emphasized innovative solutions for environmental challenges and sustainable consumption and production (SCP), with resolutions on single-use plastics, circular economy, and biodiversity conservation. UNEA-5 (2021-2022) further reinforced global commitments by addressing emerging issues, such as highly hazardous pesticides, nitrogen management, and sustainable infrastructure. UNEA-6 (2024) continued this trajectory by calling for transformative actions on plastic pollution, promoting nature-based solutions, and advancing the development of a legally binding global framework on chemicals and waste. Notably, a key resolution at UNEA-5 initiated the process for an international legally binding instrument on plastic pollution, including in the marine environment, which remains a pivotal global priority.

21. This section presents an overview of the key UNEA resolutions adopted between 2015 and 2025, grouped by thematic area in accordance with the methodology (detailed in Annex II). The initial analysis started with a list of 68 resolutions from consecutive UNEA meetings. After two rounds of screening, this list was narrowed down to 25 resolutions deemed relevant for further analysis in line with defined methodology.

22. Resolutions clustered per theme are listed in Table 1 and consist of 12 selected resolutions for land-based pollution, three for the marine litter/plastic pollution; one resolution for nitrogen management; seven resolutions for sustainable consumption and production and one resolution for nature-based solutions.

23. Regarding the resolutions in marine litter and plastic pollution theme, UNEA 3 also adopted a resolution on Marine Litter and Microplastics (UNEP/EA.3/Res.7). While the theme remains highly relevant, subsequent UNEA meetings adopted additional resolutions that build upon and refine previous commitments. To ensure coherence, avoid redundancy, and align with the most up-to-date global policy direction, the analysis focuses on the latest resolutions addressing this issue. This approach also takes into account the ongoing negotiations and INC meetings for the development of a new international treaty on plastic pollution.

24. Resolutions under the nutrient management cluster it should be noted that considering cross-cutting nature of environmental challenges and the interconnections among policy areas,

several resolutions addressing water management-related issues have been classified under the theme of Land-Based Pollution which also touch up on nitrogen management. While some of these resolutions are also relevant to this theme, these resolutions cover additional aspects beyond nutrient management. Consequently, they have been already categorized under Land-Based Pollution to reflect their broader scope.

25. Resolutions under the sustainable consumption and production cluster listed in Table 1 consists of 8 selected resolutions. The main theme of these resolutions are circular economy, and innovative solutions. It should be noted that several Resolutions listed in Table 1, also contribute to addressing the root causes of land-based pollution and plastic pollution. Additionally, the Resolution on sustainable infrastructure also include a provision related to Nature-based solutions that could fit under the next theme.

26. Resolutions under the NbS cluster are listed consists of one selected resolution. It should be noted that the sustainable infrastructure resolution (UNEP/EA.4/Res.5) listed under the SCP theme also contain a provision on the promotion of nature-based solutions.

27. In addition to the UNEA resolutions, the Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee (INC) process has been advancing the development of **a global legally binding instrument on plastic pollution, including in the marine environment**, as mandated by UNEA resolution 5/14. Although the INC process was expected to conclude with an agreement on the final text of the treaty by the end of 2024, significant disagreements on key topics prevented a final consensus. The current draft treaty text, released after INC-5 in Busan, includes numerous bracketed sections, reflecting unresolved differences among countries. Areas of divergence include plastic product design, chemicals of concern, production limits, and financing mechanisms. Other crucial elements of the treaty address release and leakages, including issues related to pre-production pellets, abandoned fishing gear, and pollution from plastic waste entering the marine environment. The Chair's text from INC-5¹ has been agreed upon as the starting point for discussions during the resumed session to be organised in mid-2025.

3.2. Review of regional policies / Barcelona Convention Decisions and thematic clustering

28. The review of the COP Barcelona Decisions focused on screening the decisions related to the pre-defined themes: (i) pollution / marine litter reduction and prevention, (ii) waste and marine litter management, (iii) plastic pollution and (iv) climate change and climate vulnerability. Moreover, additional analysis was performed following the same themes of the UNEA resolutions.

29. The review of decisions adopted under the Barcelona Convention since 2015, following the methodology in Annex III, an initial list of 81 decisions endorsed by consecutive COP Meetings (COP19 until COP23) were selected. The list was narrowed down to 14 decisions which were relevant for the gap analysis with the selected UNEA resolutions. Additionally, several decisions related to LBS Protocol Regional Plans adopted before 2015 were included, as their reference was considered necessary to perform a comprehensive gap analysis.

30. The list of selected, in accordance with the methodology, COP decisions are listed in Table 2 below.

31. Regarding the list of selected decisions related to nutrient management, it should be noted

that several decisions classified under the land-based pollution theme are also relevant for this theme, in particular: the Regional Plans on **Urban Wastewater Treatment and Sewage Sludge Management** and Regional Plan on **Stormwater Management**.

32. No specific COP decisions regarding the theme Nature-Based Solutions were identified in this period.

33. A few key decisions related to the governance framework of National Action Plans (NAPs) were also selected for analysis, as they establish the institutional and regulatory mechanisms necessary for monitoring of the effective implementation of NAPs. These are clustered under the theme of monitoring.

34. Finally, other regional regulatory measures adopted under the LBS Protocol before year of 2015,² were used as reference in the gap analysis.

1.3 Review of European policies / EU Directives related to Marine Litter/plastic pollution and eutrophication (2020-2025)

35. Over the past five years (2020–2025), EU environmental policies have significantly evolved, introducing stricter measures to address marine litter, plastic pollution, and eutrophication. These efforts align with the objectives of the European Green Deal, adopted in December 2019, which outlines an ambitious roadmap towards a climate-neutral, resource-efficient, and pollution-free economy, while ensuring the protection of biodiversity. The policies pre-dating this period are already included in the legal framework, such as Updated Regional Marine Litter Plan.

36. Under the Green Deal, several key strategies —such as the Zero Pollution Action Plan, the Circular Economy Action Plan, and the EU Plastics Strategy—have guided the development of new directives and regulations, reinforcing obligations for waste prevention, sustainable production, and improved wastewater treatment. The growing ambition to address plastic pollution and nutrient discharge reflects the EU's commitment to reducing environmental harm in marine and coastal ecosystems.

37. Additionally, the EU Biodiversity Strategy for 2030 emphasizes the need to reduce pollution impacts on marine and coastal ecosystems. While it does not directly regulate plastic pollution or eutrophication, it reinforces commitments to marine ecosystem restoration, sustainable water management, and the reduction of pollution sources, aligning with broader EU environmental objectives.

38. The table 3 below summarizes the key European policy documents related to marine litter, plastic pollution, and eutrophication that have been adopted since 2020. This list will serve as a reference for the formulation of NAP measures, guiding to assess where NAP measures can be aligned with existing formulation of measures in EU policies. The goal is to facilitate coherence and integration between national, regional, and EU governance levels.

4. GAP Analyses

39. The GAP analysis follows the previously (step 4) described methodology (Section 2), structuring answers around the following options:

- **Fully Addressed:** The resolution is covered by a Barcelona Convention decision and no further action is needed
- **Partially Addressed:** Correspondences are documented, but gaps remain therefore, additional measures are required for consideration.
- **Not Addressed:** No equivalent regional measure exists therefore; new measures are required for consideration.

40. The GAP analyses presented in the Annex I, summarizes commonalities and gaps between global (UNEA) and regional (Barcelona Convention/UNEP-MAP) policies aiming to assess whether the UNEA resolutions are transposed at regional level in UNEP/MAP. The analyses highlights areas where regional frameworks may not fully align with UNEA commitments and outlines recommendations for MED POL's future Programme of Work (PoW) and UNEP/MAP Medium-Term Strategy (MTS) as well as proposes the formulation of possible measures for the NAP update (2025-2035).

41. The selected UNEA Resolutions, in Annex I, are grouped by thematic area, followed by a column indicating the relevant Barcelona Convention instruments (Protocols or Regional Plans) and the level of alignment is visually represented using an infographic indicator (well aligned, partially aligned, not aligned). The final column in the GAP table summarizes key findings as well as proposes next steps, with proposed actions at both the regional (R) and national (N) levels for consideration.

5. Proposed Potential Measures for new NAPs

42. The Table 4 below presents the list of **proposed potential measures** for consideration in the updated National Action Plans (NAPs) 2025–2035, in line with the analyses of this report. The potential measures should be used with guidance considering national priorities and global commitments. They are intended to support Contracting Parties in identifying potential areas for strengthening their National Action Plans (NAPs) to better align with global commitments.

43. The table ensures clarity and ease of reference, by clustering the UNEA Resolution by respective key thematic area in line with the purpose of the analyses as below:

44. Used acronyms for the thematic areas:

- **LBP:** Land-based pollution
- **MLPP:** Marine Litter/Plastic Pollution
- **NM:** Nutrient management
- **SCP:** Sustainable Consumption and Production
- **NBS:** Nature-Based Solutions

45. For this document, each measure has been assigned a unique number (just of illustration purposes) to facilitate its identification and cross-referencing and follow up. Moreover, proposed potential measures have been classified by their type, in line with the categorization used in the previous NAPs as below:

- **Policy measures:** Broader strategies, action plans, and commitments that set the direction for implementation;
- **Legal measures:** Binding regulations, laws, and enforcement mechanisms;
- **Institutional measures:** Strengthening governance, coordination, and capacity-building;
- **Economic/Financial measures:** Incentives, taxes, subsidies, and funding mechanisms) and;
- **Technological/Technical measures:** Innovation, best practices, and infrastructure improvements.

46. These potential measures should be considered as **indicative recommendations rather than prescriptive obligations**. Their formulation, prioritization, and implementation should be adapted to each country's national priorities, global commitments, scale, etc., considering existing policies, legal frameworks, and ongoing initiatives. In some cases, proposed potential measures may already be in place at the national level, while in others, additional adjustments may be necessary to ensure practical relevance and feasibility.

47. Given the broad scope of UNEA Resolutions, which often encompass high-level commitments, the measures outlined here represent a concise selection aimed at addressing key gaps within this report, while ensuring coherence with the Barcelona Convention framework. These potential measures do not intent to cover the full national actions that could be derived from a specific UNEA resolution, that means that the commitment to specific resolution would need additional national action to be implemented, naturally, which might not be covered by this analyses report.

48. Finally, the key provisions of each selected Resolution addressed to UNEA Member States are provided in Annex IX of this report. On the other hand, Annex IX should serve as an important reference for Contracting Parties, particularly when adapting the proposed NAP measures in their national contexts. **Referring to these provisions will help ensure that the measures remain aligned with the original commitments set out in the UNEA resolutions.**

6. CONCLUSIONS

49. This report provides a comprehensive analysis of the alignment between UNEA Resolutions adopted over the past decade and the regional framework on pollution prevention and reduction in the Mediterranean.

50. The conclusion presented in the chapter focuses on recommendation regarding the proposed measures to strengthen the updated National Action Plans (NAPs) and recommendation for the next UNEP/MAP Medium-Term Strategy (MTS), ensuring greater coherence with global commitments. Among emerging issues, the analyses, *inter alia*, indicated the need for prioritizing the plastic pollution and marine litter, reflecting the high priority in the Mediterranean and the significant recent developments at global, Mediterranean, and European levels.

6.1. Key considerations including emerging issues:

51. As environmental challenges in the Mediterranean continue to evolve, to address these challenges requires more integrated, cross-sectoral, and evidence-based approaches. The analysis made through this report identifies several key consideration as **emerging issues** that should be addressed at both national and regional levels:

- **Mainstreaming biodiversity into key economic sectors** such as agriculture, fisheries, infrastructure, and tourism, ensuring pollution prevention efforts also contribute to biodiversity conservation.
- **Scaling up Nature-based Solutions (NbS)** to mitigate pollution, improve water management, and enhance coastal resilience.
- **Strengthening soil management strategies** through soil restoration programs, sustainable land-use practices, and pollution prevention measures.
- **Enhancing Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) schemes** to ensure effective waste management and circular economy approaches.
- **Advancing Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM) and Source to Sea Approach** to improve water quality, reduce nutrient pollution, and enhance ecosystem resilience as well as consider source to sea approach in the context of bridging the upstream and downstream measures for a healthier ecosystem.
- **Considering specific policy frameworks for food loss and food waste** to complement broader sustainable consumption and production (SCP) strategies.
- **Developing targeted approaches for nitrogen management**, addressing its role in eutrophication and land-based pollution.
- **Introducing new policies on hazardous substances**, including the regulation of **lead in paint, highly hazardous pesticides (HHPs), and emerging contaminants**.
- **Sustaining harmonization efforts for environmental indicators** and improving data collection, reporting, and quality to ensure informed decision-making.

6.2. Additional approaches for the development of the NAPs (2025-2025)

52. Countries updating their National Action Plans (NAPs) should consider adopting more strategic, evidence-based, and realistic approaches in line with the following pillars:

- **Comprehensive national assessments:** Countries should assess their own environmental challenges, existing policies, and priority pollution sources to ensure that selected measures are well adapted to national contexts.
- **Prioritization and long-term vision:** While setting ambitious goals is crucial, countries should also prioritize key measures based on feasibility, available resources, and expected impact. A stepwise approach, focusing on a few well-

defined actions while maintaining a long-term vision, will enhance implementation success.

- **Ensure coherence between upstream and downstream:** While developing NAP targets, particular focus should be placed in upstream measures, these measures should be developed in a holistic manner which should not only consider the requirements implementation of the ecosystem approach in the downstream, but also, integrate measures which are in upstream by allocating emphasis integrated river basin management and source to sea approach, this ensuring the health of the water continuum.
- **Strengthening monitoring frameworks:** Effective monitoring is key to measuring progress and guiding future policy adjustments. Countries should enhance data collection, introduce clear indicators, and improve transparency and public access to environmental information.
- **Leveraging EU Policies as a benchmark:** The policy developments at the EU level provide valuable guidance for non-EU Mediterranean countries, particularly regarding plastic pollution, waste management, nutrient reduction, soil management and chemical regulation. National policymakers are encouraged to align with EU best practices where possible.
- **Multi-stakeholder engagement:** Governments should engage key stakeholders—including industry, civil society, researchers, and local authorities—to ensure broad participation and shared responsibility in implementing NAP measures.

6.3. Recommendation for the next UNEP/MAP Medium-Term Strategy

53. The analysis conducted in this report and presented in Annex X, identifies opportunities for strengthening regional governance within the next UNEP/MAP Medium-Term Strategy (MTS). It is important for the Contracting Parties to use these analyses for underpinning the preparation of the next MTS.

54. Strategic recommendations include, *inter alia*:

- **Developing new regional policy frameworks or action plans** on key transversal topics such as biodiversity mainstreaming, nature-based solutions, soil management and/or more specific issues like food loss and waste, nitrogen pollution, and lead in paint.
- **Enhancing policy coherence within UNEP/MAP frameworks**, ensuring stronger linkages between pollution control, biodiversity conservation, and circular economy approaches.
- **Supporting harmonized regional monitoring and data-sharing initiatives** to improve the quality and comparability of environmental assessments across Mediterranean countries.
- **Strengthening regional cooperation** by facilitating knowledge exchange, technical capacity-building, and the transfer of innovative solutions to pollution challenges.
- **Promoting financial and technical assistance mechanisms** to help Mediterranean countries implement ambitious pollution reduction measures, particularly in non-EU countries with limited resources.
- **Enhance UNEP/MAP's role in supporting the implementation of global commitments** arising from multilateral environmental agreements (MEAs) relevant to pollution prevention and reduction. This includes strengthening synergies with the Basel, Rotterdam, and Stockholm Conventions, the Global Framework on Chemicals Management, and the forthcoming legally binding treaty on plastic pollution. UNEP/MAP can facilitate knowledge exchange, promote

regional coordination, and support capacity-building efforts to ensure effective implementation at the Mediterranean level.

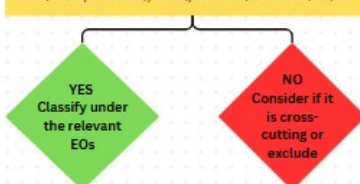

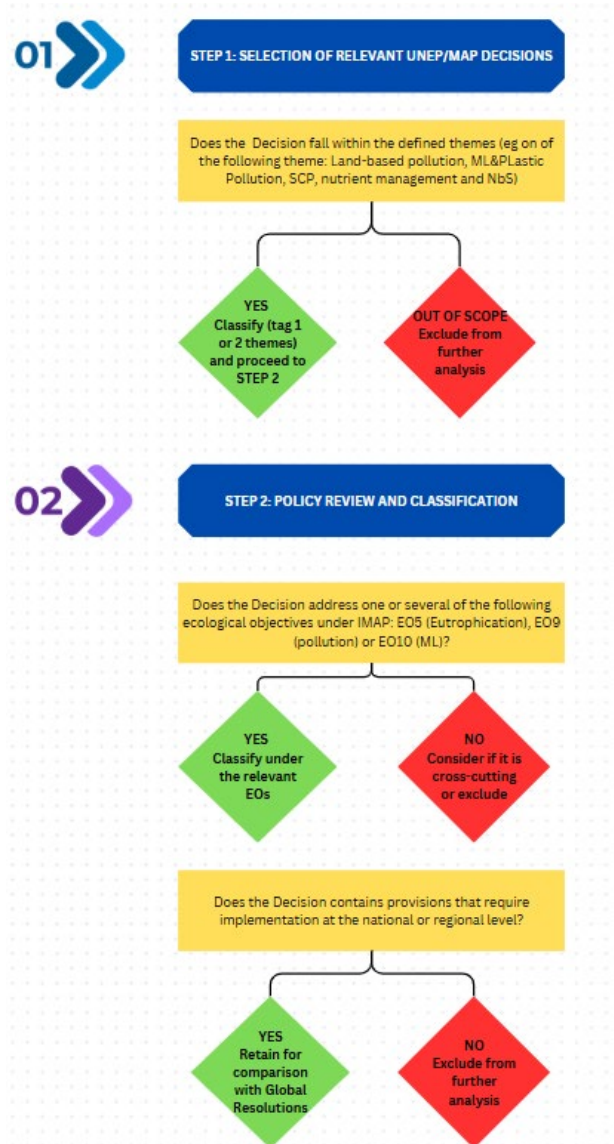

Requests all Member States and members of specialized agencies, and invites relevant international organizations, where applicable, to undertake and implement the following, individually and collectively, as appropriate: (a) To protect, conserve, restore and ensure the sustainable use of lakes, including aspects such as water quality, erosion, sedimentation and aquatic biodiversity, through integrated management at all levels, as set out in targets 6.5 and 6.6 of the Sustainable Development Goals, addressing the water body and the entire lake basin, supported by relevant regulation, institutional development, budget allocations, well-managed monitoring and data, integrated research, sustainable technology and international cooperation; (b) To integrate lakes into national and regional development plans, including in climate adaptation, water resource management and conservation of biodiversity, to advance the attainment of Sustainable Development Goal 6, and of climate resilience and biodiversity conservation; (c) To take into account their local culture and knowledge and their dependence and impact on lakes, ensuring engagement with and capacity-building for local communities and indigenous peoples, as appropriate, and in accordance with national circumstances; (d) To involve all stakeholders, including university and research centres, private companies and non-governmental organizations, in a concerted effort to implement sustainable lake management; e) To take into account research and scientific guidance, with an emphasis on science-policy linkage; (f) To develop international networking and collaboration for integrated sustainable and climate-resilient lake management and regularly exchange data and information between States that share a transboundary lake, as provided for in international agreements;
